
The Missing Link in Veterans' Health:



DENTAL CARE

U.S. veterans must meet one of the following criteria **TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR DENTAL BENEFITS** through the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs:¹

- BE PERMANENTLY AND TOTALLY 100% DISABLED DUE TO A SERVICE-CONNECTED INCIDENT
- HAVE A SERVICE-RELATED DENTAL CONDITION
- HAVE A SERVICE-RELATED MEDICAL CONDITION THAT IS AFFECTED BY THEIR MOUTH
