

SSG STEVE NASH, US ARMY 2ND PLATOON, B COMPANY, 3RD BATTALION, 75TH RANGER REGIMENT



Operation Gothic Serpent was a military operation conducted in Mogadishu, Somalia by an American-led coalition during the Somali Civil War in 1993.

The mission ultimately culminated in what became known as the Battle of Mogadishu. On the afternoon of 3 October 1993, the task force sent 19 aircraft, 12 vehicles, and 160 men to arrest 22 Somali insurgents.

The Somalis were quickly arrested, and the prisoners were loaded on a convoy of ground vehicles. However, armed militiamen and civilians converged on the area from all over the city, and the battle began. During the first hours, an MH-60 Black Hawk, "Super Six One," was shot down by a rocket-propelled grenade (RPG). Both pilots were killed. Later, another Black Hawk, "Super Six Four," was shot down.

No rescue team was immediately available, and the surviving crew couldn't move. So two Delta snipers, Master Sergeant Gary Gordon and Sergeant First Class Randy Shughart, provided cover from a helicopter. They repeatedly volunteered to secure the crash site. On their third try, they were given permission, and both men dropped into the site fully aware that

it would probably cost them their lives. During the fire fight, Gordon and Shughart were killed after they ran out of ammo, and Black Hawk pilot Michael Durant was taken hostage. Shughart and Gordon were both posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for their actions.

Meanwhile, the remaining Rangers and Delta operators fought their way to the first crash site. They soon found themselves surrounded by thousands of Somali militia. Repeated attempts to overrun US positions were beaten back. A rescue convoy was organized, made up of the US Army's 10th Mountain Division and Malaysian & Pakistani forces. In heavy combat with the Somalis, the rescue convoy broke through and rescued the besieged forces.

The mission's objective of capturing Somali insurgents was accomplished, but the battle turned out to be the most difficult close combat that US troops had engaged in since the Vietnam War. Two Black Hawks were shot down. 19 US troops were Killed in Action along with a Malaysian and a Pakistani soldier. 82 US troops were wounded. 57 Silver Stars and two Distinguished Flying Crosses were awarded.

ABOUT STAFF SERGEANT STEVE NASH

Born in Chicago in 1966 and raised in the UP of Michigan, Steve Nash enlisted in the US Army in May, 1984. His training at Ft Benning, GA included basic, advanced, airborne, and Ranger training.

In his career, SSG Nash participated in three combat deployments: Operation Just Cause, Panama in 1989; Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm in 1990-1991; and Operation Gothic Serpent, Somalia in 1993.

In Desert Storm during the Battle of Medina Ridge, then SGT Nash rescued two tank crewmen after their M1 tank was hit and set on fire. For this courage under fire, he received the Bronze Star for Valor.

In Somalia, SSG Nash was part of Task Force Ranger which was composed of US Army Rangers, Delta Force Operators, Special Operations Aviation; Navy SEALS and Air Force Pararescuemen. He served as 1st Squad Leader and Assistant Platoon Sergeant in the 2nd Platoon, B Company, 3rd Battalion of the 75th Ranger Regiment.

It was during the Battle of Mogadishu, 3-4 Oct 1993 that SSG Nash experienced the most intense battle since the Vietnam War. He was part of the mission to rescue personnel in two downed Black Hawk helicopters. During this intense 18-hour battle, SSG was able to rescue Master Sergeant Brad Haley who had lost a leg in the crash. Under intense fire, he applied a tourniquet

and placed MSG Haley in an evacuation chopper. Then he continued fighting until he and the remaining force ran to safety behind the rescuing armor unit. This 1.25 mile run has been called the Mogadishu Mile. SSG Nash was stuck 13 times by enemy fire. Three times, the fire struck his body while 10 hits to his body armor caused multiple broken bones and injuries. After months of recovery from his wounds, SSG Nash was discharged from the US Army in May, 1994.

SSG Nash wears bracelets to honor and remember the 19 members of Task Force Ranger who made the ultimate sacrifice for our Nation.
